Jane Dens McManigal, 88, Beloved Wife, Mother and Grandmother



Golf Outing on October 12 To Aid Those With Autism

AREA — "A Round for Autism," a charity golf outing sponsored by the New Jersey Autism Foundation Inc., will be held on Monday, October 12, at Hamilton Farm Golf Course in Gladstone.

"These supplementary resources will enable individuals with autism to reach their maximum potential and become independent, productive members of society," said Mr. Tokash.





Great Swamp Grading Card To Be Topic For Old Guard

Ms. Kelm will describe the Great Swamp Report Card. The Report Card synthesizes all the stream monitoring data collected by GSWA during 2014 and grades the five main streams entering the Swamp. She will highlight what the grades mean and the implications for landowners, municipalities and counties. The Card serves as a barometer

of watershed health, and informs the public of issues related to water pollution, land use and water pro-
